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FOREWORD

This revised and expanded bibliography on recreation is issued in response to many requests for up-to-date information concerning the best that has been written on this subject. In its compilation the aim has been to make it, not an exhaustive bibliography, but a fairly comprehensive, carefully selected list of the more important and readily available books, pamphlets, reports and articles dealing with the many phases of recreation, that it may serve as a practical source book on those topics. Effort has been made to exclude all out-of-print books and pamphlets, and the articles listed are in publications to be found in most public libraries. The bibliography also lists the leading American organizations and magazines in this field.

The work of collecting, analyzing and organizing this material has extended over much of the past year and a half, and has been conducted with great thoroughness. In this task Miss Williams has had most helpful and valued co-operation from publishers, librarians, and recreation agencies, and from a number of authorities in various branches, who have carefully checked over the sections devoted to their subjects.

The titles are classified and arranged by sections under twenty-four main subject-headings. At the beginning of each section reference is made by number to other sections containing additional related material. Cross-reference is employed where a publication covers more than one of the sectional subjects.

The addresses of the publishers, when not given in the entries themselves, will be found in the list at the end of the bibliography. These are given to facilitate ordering, in case the publications desired are not in the local public library. Where funds are available, the library authorities are usually glad to add new material for which there is an evident demand.

The Russell Sage Foundation has in stock only its own publications, and cannot furnish any of the other listed material. Orders for the latter should be sent directly to the publishers.

association of many organizations, national in scope, which are interested in the promotion and development of one or more kinds of recreation, in the use of which the land, water, forest, plant, scenic or wild life resources of the United States are essential. Its function is to assist in the working out of a national policy which will co-ordinate the activities of federal, state, county, municipal and unofficial agencies in the field of outdoor recreation and to promote the development of the recreational resources of the country and stimulate their use.
